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Jackson Twp & Kingston Twp Appoint Back Mountain Regional EMS to Provide Ambulance Service



Back Mountain Regional has been named as the official service for Jackson Township and Kingston Township. This change was made after the Jackson Township Ambulance and the Trucksville Fire, Rescue & EMS companies announced they had decided they could no longer provide ambulance services due to the cost of staffing a 24 hour per day service.

Back Mountain Regional EMS has been providing both of these communities with ambulance service since 2011 as their Advanced Life Support ambulance provider. In this role, they responded to approximately

85% of all Township ambulance calls along with your local ambulance and provided the care needed on the most serious emergencies.

Back Mountain Regional EMS currently conducts an annual subscription. We will honor all existing membership subscriptions that were in effect with Trucksville or Jackson Township. This year's new annual subscription will be sent out in May, with the subscription running through June 30, 2016. The generous donations from members of the Back Mountain community allows us to provide 24 hour staffing, replace ambulances when necessary, purchase new equipment, as well as improved training for EMTs and paramedics.

About Back Mountain Regional

Back Mountain Regional Fire & EMS was formed in 2013 as a combination of Dallas Fire & Ambulance, Lehman Township Volunteer Fire Department, Shavertown Volunteer Fire Company.



Through this regionalization, the company provides several Back Mountain communities with the area's premiere fire and ambulance service. The exceptional staff of paramedics

and EMTs are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, with access to 4 first-rate ambulances and a variety of fire trucks.

The ambulance service currently has two paid crews to serve the residents of its municipalities. Back Mountain Regional employs ten full-time employees and ten part-time workers in addition to its volunteer members. The team averages six to eight calls a day, 3,000 calls a year.

As we work together as a community, we continually grow and improve our services to better serve the Back Mountain.

Geisinger Health System Awards



Back Mountain Regional Fire & EMS was recognized by Geisinger Health System for their exceptional response time, which is well below the national standard. Our "door-to-balloon time" (a time measurement for emergency cardiac care) of 911 dispatch to hospital procedure time is averaged at less than 60 minutes, while the national goal is to be below 90 minutes.
